PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The year before an Olympic and Paralympic Games is always a vital one for elite sport and Rowing Australia (RA) was no different across the 2023 reporting period.

The year before an **Olympic and Paralympic Games** is always a vital one for elite sport and **Rowing Australia** (RA) was no different across the 2023 reporting period.

A short turnaround between the Games of Tokyo and Paris has meant our athletes, coaches, High Performance and support staff had to accelerate their preparation. This is the same challenge for all countries in the lead up to Paris, and the **Australian Rowing Team** has carefully planned their program to deliver an optimal performance when it counts.

As President, it brings me great pride to see our sport work so closely together, across so many areas, to ensure our athletes remain the priority and are focused on their performances in the Green and Gold in Paris.

Our coaches and High Performance staff have been at the pointy end of the shortened cycle and I commend Performance Director Paul Thompson MBE, Men's Head Coach Rhett Ayliffe, Women's Head Coach John Keogh, Para Head Coach Chad King and their teams for their tireless and targeted efforts. Our rowers also receive exceptional support from highly skilled and passionate support staff focused on their health, performance and wellbeing, on and off the water.

It has also been pleasing to see a new generation of champions transition from pathways into the **Australian Rowing Team**, and the pipeline of talent build for the future. The future of our sport, and many of the medalists of the Los Angeles and Brisbane Olympics, are currently in our pathway programs and will be watching our crews race in **Paris 2024**.

Our team qualified nine boats for the Paris Olympic Games via the World Rowing Championships and three for the Paralympic Games. We hope to welcome other Australian crews to the Olympic team following the Final Qualifying Regatta in Lucerne.

It was also gratifying to see rowing take such a central role in the Olympic lead-up, both in Australia and internationally. Two of our great champions, Lucy Stephan OAM and Alex Hill OAM, represented our sport with pride and humility; Lucy at the Australian Olympic Committee's One Year to Go celebrations, and Alex receiving the official invite for the Australian Olympic Team to the Games from International Olympic Committee President Thomas Bach OLY.

Our sport has been such a strong contributor in the Olympic space and it was fitting to see two of our best fly the flag on behalf of everyone at RA.

ROWING ACROSS THE NATION

The return of the Australian Rowing Championships to my hometown of Perth was a major highlight across the reporting period. Western Australia has a strong and dedicated rowing community that has produced some fine rowers, so it was great to see Champion Lakes become the focal point of our sport for the week.

I extend my thanks to **Tourism WA** and the **West Australian Government** for hosting us so graciously. I had the chance to take on then Sports Minister, now Premier **Roger Cook MLA**, in a good-natured race on the erg to launch the event, which showed not only do they love our sport, but they are also great sports themselves. Well done to the **RA team** for delivering such a magnificent event, and **Rowing WA CEO Dan Tackenberg** and his team for their support.

The clubs, schools and volunteers who made such an immense effort - many of them traveling great distances - to support the event should be applauded. That dedication made it a Championships to remember.

ROWING AUSTRALIA FOUNDATION

It was an honour to be appointed as the chair of the Rowing Australia Foundation, which was inaugurated in 2023, and launched in the following reporting period. The RA Foundation presents an opportunity to leverage the generosity of those that love rowing and want to invest in the sport for the future, to build greater financial resilience and provide the capacity and flexibility to support our athletes in the future.

Put simply, the Foundation is dedicated to championing the sport nationwide and ensuring our rising and established athletes have the resources needed to succeed and flourish. We intend to build a legacy of excellence, rigorously governed, with funds expertly invested for generations to come.

My thanks go to everyone who has played a role in establishing this vital Foundation including Malcolm Batten OAM, Bryan Weir and John Boultbee AM. Their experience will see our sport in the very best of hands.

BOARD MOVEMENTS

Bryan Weir completed his tenure on the RA Board but is still heavily involved in the sport, especially in the abovementioned RA Foundation. On behalf of the Board, I thank Bryan for his expertise, passion and dedication; a lifelong rowing man through and through.

It was my pleasure to welcome Richard Finlayson to the Board. Richard was a former Australian Rowing Team member who has gone on to a decorated career in media and broadcasting, with appointments including the Chief Operating Officer of SBS and Director of Television at the ABC. He is currently the joint CEO of production house Wooden Horse.

Ben Dodwell was re-elected to the Board, and continues to play an important role as Deputy Chair and Chair of the Audit & Risk Committee. Georgia Beattie was also reappointed, and continues to provide significant support to Row Nation.

FUNDING CLIMATE

Rowing Australia welcomed the one-off \$20m investment from the Australian Government that helped sports and athletes ahead of the Paris 2024 Olympic and Paralympic Games. The funds were administered by the Australian Sports Commission (ASC) and aligned with the High Performance 2032+ Sport Strategy. Rowing Australia received some funding through this program, that helps to offset the inflationary challenges we have experienced in recent years, notably with international travel and airfares.

We thank the **ASC** for its support and partnership across rowing. We also acknowledge the growing headwinds facing **National Sporting Organisations** (NSOs) as they try to ensure they cultivate and offer a world-class High Performance culture, especially in the context of a home **Olympic and Paralympic Games** in 2032.

The Board remained prudent with expenditure and will continue to advocate on behalf of rowing for funding commensurate with our contribution to Australian success on the international stage and our active, healthy culture as a nation. Through ongoing advocacy, we are demonstrating how rowing is a sport for all ages, deeply connected in the community, and expanding into new

and vibrant formats such as indoor and coastal rowing that will further expand participation. Parallel to that, we are also always seeking to identify new sources of revenue and commercial growth for **RA**.

We intend to build a legacy of excellence, rigorously governed, with funds expertly invested for generations to come.

Growing compliance and governance obligations for **NSOs** are important planks for integrity across the sector, and while the Board treats governance very seriously, they do present additional costs and obligations to manage.

KEY STAKEHOLDERS AND SUPPORTERS

RA is grateful to have so many supporters, none more than our Patron Mrs Gina Rinehart AO, and Hancock Prospecting. Hancock's direct athlete funding support was extended until 2028, guiding us through another Olympic cycle and providing assurance and confidence for our rowers and RA more generally.

Hancock's backing underpins so much of what **RA** is able to achieve and on a personal note, on behalf of the Board, I thank **Mrs Rinehart** for her heartfelt personal interest and friendship with our rowers, coaches and staff.

After so many changes across the sporting landscape in the previous reporting period, it was a year of relative stability. We acknowledge the work of Kieren Perkins OAM at the Australian Sports Commission, our Major Partner, and we were proud to be part of working groups that contributed to key strategies like Win Well.

In the Olympic space, we thank Australian Olympic Committee President Ian Chesterman AM and CEO Matt Carroll AM for their energetic work ahead of Paris, likewise Paralympics Australia President Alison Creagh AM CSC and CEO Catherine Clark. Thanks also to Sports Minister the Honourable Anika Wells MP, who we welcomed to our Men's National Training Centre in Canberra on a chilly morning to row in the men's eight.

I must also acknowledge the contribution of outgoing RA CEO Ian Robson, who left midway through the reporting period. Ian was a charismatic and passionate leader for our sport and we wish him well in his future roles. His successor, Sarah Cook OLY, is well equipped for the role, and brings exceptional capability and drive. Sarah is the first woman and the first Olympian in the role and is rightly ambitious for where our sport can go in the future.

This will be my final contribution to the annual report as I conclude my role as President in 2024. It has been good to be able to give something back to a sport that has given me so much.

I would like to thank my fellow directors, and those that have been on our board over the past year, for their support and effort. I also recognise the important role of our State Associations and Councillors, without whom we could not have affected the changes that have been no important for our sport. We often have different perspectives and objectives, but we have more in common than differences.

We are all volunteers that are willing to give our time and effort to the sport we love in the hope that the next generation will have the opportunity to share a love and enjoyment for the greatest sport in the world, at whichever level they choose to participate.


The sporting strategies, programs and facilities we deliver now have the capacity to shape Australia's long-term prosperity, well beyond sporting boundaries.

AUSTRALIAN OLYMPIC COMMITTEE (AOC) CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT



Australia's participation in the Pacific Games in Solomon Islands was a high point in a very successful year for the Australian Olympic Committee (AOC).

As we approached the Olympic year in Paris, Australia's 70 strong team had an enjoyable and fruitful Games in Honiara. Importantly, the team left Honiara with 13 quota places in boxing and archery. Every team member secured a medal, competing in eight of the 24 sports being contested at the Games. The team was very grateful for the hospitality it received and left with wonderful memories as well as a medal haul of 50 gold, 24 silver and 10 bronze.

The Australian Olympic Committee (AOC) has been deeply involved in preparations for the Paris 2024 Olympic Games throughout 2023.

By year's end, three athletes had been selected – Olympic champion Jess Fox OAM (paddle), Chelsea Gubecka (swimming) and Breiana Whitehead (sailing) for the Team which is expected to number between 460-480 athletes.

Australian athletes from all our member sports have been striving to qualify for the Games at events at home and abroad, so they can put themselves into a position to join the Team heading to France.

I know both the rowing and broader community is very excited about the emergence of a highly credentialled and competitive men's and women's eights with Paris in their sights. That is one of the great narratives for Australian sport as the Games draw closer.

We have an extraordinary group of Team leaders in place for Paris2024 with Chef de Mission Anna Meares OAM and her Deputy Chefs - Kenny Wallace OAM, Bronwen Knox OLY, Mark Knowles OLY, Kyle Vander-Kuyp and Kaarle McCullogh.

Our first female Medical Director in Dr Carolyn Broderick joins the experienced AOC headquarters team who are devoting themselves to the task of ensuring we provide the best possible high-performance environment for Australia's athletes in Paris.

Marking one Year to Go to Paris in July this year, the AOC unveiled its AllezAus campaign (meaning "Let's Go Australia" in French) with a special event in Sydney. Our thanks to our hosts Qantas for the use of their headquarters to showcase many of our athletes and sports that will bring us some much excitement at Games' time.

While focused on Paris, the **AOC** has been deeply involved in ensuring the Olympic movement in this country is well placed to meet the needs of the future.

Brisbane 2032 represents a huge opportunity for our Olympic sports and athletes in nine years' time and beyond. The work to maximise that opportunity is on-going and, along with the eight other "Games Delivery Partners", we have been busy planning a lasting legacy to take us to the Games and for ten years beyond. A legacy that embraces not only Brisbane, Queensland and Australia, but also the entire Pacific region.

Through the Oceania National Olympic Committees (ONOC) Australia can play a critical role in our region. In April, AOC President Ian Chesterman was elected to the Board of ONOC at its General Assembly in Brisbane. Two months later Ken Wallace OAM was elected to the ONOC Athletes' Commission so he can continue his very good work there.

The AOC launched its second Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) in March 2023. The "Innovate" RAP builds on the momentum established last year and is aimed at setting new goals so we can make a difference through the power of sport.

Our Innovate RAP commitments took us to Katherine in the Northern Territory where 12 Indigenous Coaches began their Australian Olympic Indigenous Coaching Scholarship program. This partnership with Toyota has already seen four coaches graduate in basketball and we have now added swimming, hockey and athletics coaches into the scholarship program.

The coaches were given training and hands on experience in a program that will deliver further coaching modules in 2024.

The trip to Katherine also took Olympians into ten schools in the town and nearby communities, delivering the **Olympics Unleashed** program.

Importantly, the **AOC** can deliver this program in remote areas, as well as metropolitan Australia.

Olympics Unleashed continues to take Olympians and aspiring Olympians into Australian schools and communities, to inspire and motivate students to be their personal best by teaching students the importance of setting goals, overcoming challenges and finding their passion. Since the program began in 2018, some 339,478 students have received these presentations.

The AOC has been deeply involved in ensuring the Olympic movement in this country is well placed to meet the needs of the future.

Olympics Unleashed has become the largest initiative the AOC has undertaken in its role of delivering educational programs based on the principles and values of Olympism to Australian schools connecting with metro, regional and remote schools and communities.

The program is free and has been overwhelmingly welcomed by Australia's schools and communities. In 2023, Olympics Unleashed continued to operate in five Australian States and Territories: Queensland, New South Wales, South Australia, Western Australia and Northern Territory.

Elsewhere in our community engagement, the AOC officially recognized 7 high schools in NSW as Australian Olympic Pathway Schools. In naming these Australian Olympic Pathway Schools, the AOC is recognising the extraordinary opportunities available for students to pursue their athletic journey. Students at the Sports High Schools are given access to high-quality sport training environments, sports academies,

accredited coaches, support services (wellbeing, nutrition, etc) and crucially, formal pathways through to high performance teams with sports bodies. The NSW Sports High Schools have contributed more than thirty **Olympians** and **Paralympians** since Sydney 2000.

Now in its fifth year, the Australian Olympic Change-Maker™ program recognises students who are demonstrating the Olympic spirit friendship, sportsmanship and striving for excellence – both on and off the playing field, through leadership and driving positive change in their school or local community.

High schools around Australia are invited to nominate two students from across years 10-12 who are demonstrating positive change in their communities. In 2023, nearly 1000 nominations were received, representing each state and territory.

The Australian Olympic Change-Maker™ National Forum was held on 12 September ahead of a National Summit in Canberra 5-7 December. Held at the Australian Institute of Sport, 26 students selected by a panel of Olympians had the unique opportunity to learn from and collaborate with Olympians including Brooke Hanson OAM, Mack Horton OAM, Sami Kennedy-Sim, Nathan Katz and aspiring Olympian Dr Rachael Gunn.

During the Summit, students came together to share their ideas on important issues facing sport in Australia. The students' recommendations focused on the themes of social inclusion, rural and remote opportunities, sustainability, and the benefits of sport in the Australian community.

The Change-Makers presented their ideas to myself and Olympic gold medallist **Chloe Dalton OAM** at a presentation held at Parliament House.

All the AOC's community initiatives rely on the wonderful contribution of Australian Olympians to spread the Olympic message throughout the country. The commitment and efforts of Olympians to support the enormous scope of the AOC's work in the community has been outstanding.

As we approach **Paris 2024**, we wish all our athletes striving to represent their country on the Olympic stage all the very best.

Paris will be a wonderful Games and a great opportunity for our Pacific neighbours to show the world what they can do

Finally, I would like to acknowledge the great contribution made by Ian Robson, who stepped down as Chief Executive Officer this year. Ian has provided great leadership not only for the sport of rowing but has also been a positive force within our family of Olympic sports as we tackle mutual issues.

In farewelling lan, we welcomed Olympian Sarah Cook OLY who has stepped up in excellent fashion to the CEO role as we head into an exciting Olympic year. The AOC looks forward to continuing that very good relationship in the time ahead.

Since rowing became a Paralympic sport for the Beijing 2008 Games, Rowing Australia has been a leader in supporting athletes with a disability to participate and excel in rowing. The full integration of Para-athletes within the high-performance program at Rowing Australia is industry-leading and lays the foundation for success at the elite level and greater participation across the sport.

This has not come about overnight. It's the result of effective strategy and intent across the organisation, led by **President Rob Scott** and Chief Executive Officer **Ian Robson**. We thank lan for his service and warmly welcome the appointment during the reporting period of **Sarah Cook OLY** as **CEO**. CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

It brings me great pleasure to present my first Annual Report as Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of Rowing Australia (RA). It has been a busy, challenging and transformative first six months in the role but I would not have it any other way as our sport continues to take great strides both at home and on the international scene.

While there were many highlights and and administrator at club, national and memorable moments, the reporting period was largely focused on supporting our athletes, coaches and High Performance staff laying a rock-solid platform for the 2024 Olympic and Paralympic Games in Paris, which included securing all important qualification spots for Paris. A NEW ERA

Becoming the first woman - and the first Olympian - to step into the role of CEO was a welcome slice of history. THE BEST OF THE WEST

The convoys of trailers heading across The Nullabor told the story before it even started; we knew the Australian Rowing Championships of 2023 were going to be one to remember.

ARC 23 was held in Perth for the first time since 2012 and after an 11-year absence, the response from the rowing community, from athletes to coaches and volunteers, was magnificent. The event attracted record entries at Champion Lakes Centre and helped deliver more than \$13m of direct economic impact for the region.

It was a special week for some of our proud West Australian rowers, including Tokyo Gold Medallist from the Women's Four Annabelle McIntyre OAM, who featured at a media launch that saw our own President Rob Scott take on WA Sports Minister - and now Premier - Roger Cook MLA on the Concept2 machine.

Rowing Australia thanks Rowing WA Chief Executive Officer Daniel Tackenberg and his dedicated team for their immense efforts to bring it to life, as well as the WA Government and Tourism WA for their generous support. I also extend my thanks to the volunteers, officials, umpires, events team, traders, and the tireless work of the RA staff, who worked around the clock to ensure it was a success. Of course, our biggest thanks goes to the athletes, coaches, clubs and spectators for their support of our biggest annual domestic event, and for making it another record-breaker!

OLYMPIC INCLUSION

It was a momentous occasion for rowers around the world when the International Olympic Committee announced that Beach Sprint Rowing, a format of the Coastal Rowing discipline, would be included in the Los Angeles 2028 Olympic Games program. It marks the first time rowing will be featured in two different disciplines on the biggest stage of them all.

The inclusion of Beach Sprint Rowing in the 2028 Olympic Games program was the outcome of a decade-long development of Coastal Rowing with the active support of our 159 members and rowing communities across the world. That growth is particularly important in our region of Oceania, with our abundant beaches and love of the sea

It also opens up new nations to our sport, some of which aren't able to compete globally in the traditional flatwater events. We welcomed Papua New Guinea as one of the newest Member Federations for **World Rowing**, a development spurred on by the rise of Coastal Rowing. That's just one example of how Coastal Rowing and Beach Sprints has shifted the dial and engaged new athletes, communities and fans.

Closer to home, Rowing Australia signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Surf Life Saving Australia, whose members have a fine pedigree of rowing surf boats through the challenging and unpredictable conditions that make the Beach Sprints format so compelling. Our shared vision with Surf Life Saving Australia can help offer those athletes an Olympic pathway and we welcome them to the fold.

And while World Rowing celebrated the Olympic announcement, RA was - like many Australian National Sporting Organisations - disappointed by the cancellation of the 2026 Commonwealth Games due to be hosted by Victoria.

Beach Sprints had been listed to make their Games debut and we will work closely with Commonwealth Games Australia (CGA) to ensure the sport remains on the program when a new host emerges. We also extend our thanks to CGA for their ongoing support via the Green2Gold2Great program, which is helping to fund our emerging Coastal Rowing program.

A CHERISHED PARTNERSHIP

No sport in Australia has a stronger partnership than rowing's link with Hancock Prospecting and our Patron, Mrs Gina Rinehart AO. It was another watershed moment for RA when Hancock extended its major partnership until the 2028 Olympic and Paralympic Games in Los Angeles.

The impact of such an announcement cannot be understated. This four-year deal provides certainty to our elite athletes, in particular, who benefit from the generous direct funding that allows them to focus on achieving their goals and dreams in the green and gold.









Hancock's and Mrs Rinehart's relationship with RA dates back to 2015 and has revolutionised the High Performance program. The results were on show in Tokyo in 2021, when Australian rowers collected two Gold Medals and two Bronze Medals at the Olympic Games and a Silver Medal at the Paralympic Games.

Mrs Rinehart also launched the Patron's Medal Achievement Incentive Fund, which will commit an additional \$3m over two years in the lead up to and during the Paris 2024 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

It will provide performance-based payments to the country's best rowers, swimmers, volleyballers and artistic swimmers should they win medals at a World Championships, Olympic or Paralympic Games. It is the only private performance initiative of its scale to benefit Australian Olympic and Paralympic sport medal achievers, outside Government and Australian Olympic Committee funding.

RA was proud to recognise Mrs Rinehart with the inaugural Service to Rowing Award at our annual gala the Hancock Prospecting Rower of the Year Awards function in Canberra and looks forward to working closely with Hancock Prospecting over the next Olympic and Paralympic cycle.

WORLD ROWING

RA is committed to not only making the sport stronger domestically but ensuring our officials, athletes and administrators are able to contribute their expertise globally. It remains my pleasure to serve on the World Rowing Council as the Continental Representative for Oceania, and in late-2023 finished my roles with the Coastal Rowing Commission and GEDI (Gender Equality, Diversity and inclusion) Cross Commission.

I also acknowledge Rowing Australia's standing representatives on the various World Rowing Commissions: Nick Hunter OAM (Umpiring Commission), Gordon Marcks (Para Commission), Luke Letcher (Athletes Commission), Paul Thompson MBE (Competitive Rowing Commission), Jaime Fernandez OLY (Youth Commission), and Dr Laryssa Trease (Sports Medicine Commission).

Olympic champion **Duncan Free OAM** has taken up the role as President of the **Oceania Rowing Confederation**, while **Cameron Allen** (Coastal Rowing Commission) and **Georgia Beattie** (Indoor Rowing Commission) are welcome new additions to the WR Commissions.

ON THE WATER

The results were strong right across our elite and pathway programs during the racing season in Europe. The year before an **Olympic and Paralympic Games** is primarily focused on qualifying boats; the **Australian Rowing Team** booked lanes for nine **Olympic** boats of 14 classes and three out of five Para classes. The platform has been set.

The PR3 Mixed Double of Nikki Ayers PLY and Jed Altschwager had a year to remember and swept all before them, storming their way to a World Rowing Championship Gold Medal and being named as World Rowing's Para Crew of the Year. Their prospects for Paris are looking bright.

Our Men's Eight made history when they won Gold at the **Rowing World Cup** in Lucerne, ending a 37-year drought on the international stage. They would go on to claim Bronze at the **World Rowing Championships**, one of five medals collected by the Australian team. Now we turn our eyes to the great stage of the **Olympic** and **Paralympic regatta**.

AGAINST THE ODDS

RA acknowledges the tremendous bravery of former Australian Rowing Team member **Georgia Nesbitt**, who was involved in a serious cycling accident and was left in a coma after a serious head injury.

Georgia never gave up and with the support of her family and medical staff, fought her way back to good health and was honoured as a retiree at the Hancock Prospecting Rower of the Year Awards. The incredible support from her friends at club, state and national level was inspirational and Georgia has since joined RA as an underage selector.

RA also paid tribute to retiree Angus Moore, who represented Australia for a long period at Junior, Under 23 and Senior World Rowing Championship level, as well as multiple World Rowing Cups.

GOVERNANCE AND ENGAGEMENT

Following the completion of the 2023
Australian Sports Commission Sports
Governance Standards assessment,
RA has implemented some immediate
changes including the development or
update of the following key documents:

- RA Director Code of Conduct (Standard 1.1)
- RA Board Charter (Standard 5.5)
- RA Finance, Audit and Risk Committee Charter (Standard 6.1)
- RA Directors' Conflict of Interest Policy and Form (Standard 6.4)

RA has formed a working group, comprised of the CEO and two RA Directors, to consider how we can address Standard 4.2 - Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI), in relation to Board composition. This work has been focused on developing and publishing the Board's DEI goals and the resulting action plan and achievement against these goals, which we aim to complete by mid-2024.

Following jurisdictional issues, an update of the National Integrity Framework (NIF) policies were approved and adopted. RA thanks Sport Integrity Australia for its ongoing support of the rollout and for funding for the role of National Integrity Manager, which is a critical function within the RA structure.

RA has had a strong focus on advocacy and engagement with government at all levels, from local councils and LGAs to state and federal government. This has been across a range of areas, including sport investment, parliamentary friendship groups, sport promotion, sport development in the Oceania region, protection and access to waterways and critical venues, and procurement of event funding and support.

Her board contribution is enhanced by 20 years in leadership roles spanning regional to international contexts - at the AICD, Government House in Canberra, emergency services, higher education and the private sector, with early career experience in health.

Sally is focussed on adding value to organisations at board level through good governance; whole-of-enterprise risk management; strengthening safety and crisis management; improving sustainability; and effective influencing of key stakeholders. A trusted adviser to boards, company directors, CEOs and viceregal representatives, Sally is presently a board director, Minerva mentor, Honorary Aide to the Governor of Victoria and event moderator.

In addition to qualifications in governance, business and management, Sally completed the High Performance Leadership Program at Oxford University.

DIRECTOR

Brvan Weir

Bryan Weir was elected to the Rowing Australia Board in May of 2015. An accomplished rower, Weir represented Australia in the Men's Coxless Pair in the World Rowing Championships in Lucerne in 1974 and was part of the New South Wales King's Cup Eight in 1976. At a rowing administration level, prior to his role with Rowing Australia, Bryan held the positions of Deputy President of Rowing New South Wales and was Board Member of the Sydney International Rowing Regatta and President of Mosman Rowing Club.

Weir graduated from the University of New South Wales with degrees in Law and Commerce in 1976. He joined the law firm Freehill Hollingdale & Page (now Freehills), becoming a partner in 1980. In 1993, he left Freehills to become a divisional director of Macquarie Bank, where he remained until 1998. Since then he has (with a business partner) established and operated a private investment and advisory group, while he is also a Director of L.J. Hooker Ltd, a position he has held since 2014.

ATHLETES' REPRESENTATIVE

Luke Letcher

Luke is a former Australian Rowing Team member, first representing Australia in 2012 in the U19 team. In 2013 he was selected in the U21 team, and in 2016, he raced in the U23 Men's Quad Sculls that won the Gold Medal at the World Championships. He was then selected for three-consecutive Australian World Championships teams from 2017 to 2019, leading to his selection into the Tokyo Olympic team. Luke was part of the Men's Quad Sculls that would take him to an Olympic Bronze Medal.

Away from rowing, Luke graduated from the Australian National University with a Bachelor of Engineering, having studied throughout his time on the Australian Rowing Team. He currently lives in Sydney, working with Thales Australia as a systems engineer. From 2020 to 2022, Luke was an elected director on the board of Rowing ACT and in 2022 was also appointed to the World Rowing Athletes' Commission.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Sarah Cook OLY

A dual Olympian in Rowing and an Australian representative in Sailing, Sarah is now focused on driving the development of sport globally with a particular focus on gender equality and sport for development. Through her roles in high performance governance, administration, leadership and coaching, Sarah has led the development of winning cultures across sport at a national and international level.

Despite having only retired from competitive sport in 2015, Sarah has already established herself as one of Australia's most respected emerging leaders in sport. She has created a lasting impact in international sport, influenced positive outcomes through lobbying Government, advisory to national and international sporting organisations, and involvement in large scale national and international sporting events. Her insight into people development, leading with influence, and driving a performance culture all with a people-centred approach make her a unique and highly sought-after leader.

Sarah's journey into sport started at a young age, after watching the opening ceremony of the Barcelona Olympic Games at the age of 7, the flame was lit within her. Sarah's dream was to one day compete at the Olympic Games and to represent Australia, something she achieved 16 years later when she competed at the 2008 Beijing Olympics in Rowing. Sarah went on to represent Australia in the sports of Rowing and Sailing for 12 years and competed at two Olympic Games. During her time as an athlete, Sarah campaigned for gender equality and throughout her professional career has used her platform to further this agenda both nationally and internationally.

Sarah is currently the CEO of Rowing Australia and is a member of the World Rowing Council as the Continental Representative for Oceania and is the first woman to hold these positions. Sarah was also the first non-British woman and third Australian to be elected a Steward of Henley Royal Regatta and is a commentator for the World Rowing international broadcast. Sarah is the proud mother of 2-year-old Max and 4-year-old Astrid and aspires to be a role model for her children by being the change that she wants to see in the sporting sector.

HIGH PERFORMANCE REPORT

Rowing Australia

OVERVIEW

The 2023 World Rowing Championships in Belgrade, Serbia was the major qualification regatta for the Paris 2024 Olympic and Paralympic Games and the single most important regatta since the Tokyo Olympics. The senior Australian Team also competed at World Cups in Varese, Italy and Luzern, Switzerland as preparation for the World Championships. The women's pair of Jess Morrison OAM and Annabelle McIntyre OAM complimented their racing season at the Holland-Beker Regatta, Amsterdam winning on both days and setting an unverified world best time. The Para-rowers also raced at the Gavirate International Para Regatta, Italy where all team members achieved a medal performance.

The **National Training Centres** (NTC's) continue to provide a centralised world-class daily performance environment for our 'senior A' podium potential rowers. The NTC's are the backbone of our senior team and underpins our international results. The **Pathway Program** works with our key partners in identifying and developing young athletes capable of transitioning into the NTC's and who aspire to achieve podium results. This is achieved through our state-based programs, as well as our established program identifying and supporting USA College based Australian underage rowers.

2023 saw a deepening of the squad with the return of a number of rowers who took some time away from international competition after the **Tokyo Olympics**. There continues to be a good connection between the NTC and Pathway Program by providing camp experiences at the NTC's for those rowers challenging for NTC positions. The **Paralympic Program** continues to be a camp-based program supported by our partners in the **National Institute Network** (NIN) and rowing clubs around the country.













2023 WORLD ROWING CHAMPIONSHIPS - BELGRADE, SERBIA

The World Rowing Championships were held in Belgrade, Serbia between the 3-10 September 2023 with challenging conditions across the week of racing.

Headlines included:

- Australia was represented in seventeen boat classes
- Ten crews raced in A Finals
- Five Medal Boats
- Four Olympic class medals, 21 Olympic class medalists
- A gold medal in the Paralympic PR3 Mix2x
- Nine boats qualified for the Paris 2024 Olympic Games (thirty-seven rowers)
- Three boats qualified for the Paris 2024 Paralympic Games (eight rowers)



WORLD CUP II - VARESE, ITALY

Australia finished third overall on the medal table and equal third on number of medals with eight medals including three gold medals. The gold medal performances were from the Women's Pair of Jess Morrison OAM and Annabelle McIntyre OAM, The Women's Eight and Nikki Ayers PLY and Jed Altschwager in the PR3 Mix Double Scull.



WORLD CUP III - LUZERN, SWITZERLAND

Australia finished third overall on the medal table and equal second on number of medals with six medals including two gold medals. The gold medal performances were from the Women's Pair of **Jess Morrison OAM** and **Annabelle McIntyre OAM** and the **Men's Eight** in defeating the British World Champion crew.

COACHING

Coaching development is a key pillar in the program and our coaches were part of an exchange with the **Australian Army's Combat Training Centre**, **Tully**. Key personnel from the **Combat Training Centre** were hosted at both **NTC** programs focusing in on learning techniques and assessment. **RA** coaches from the NTC's, Para and Pathway programs had an immersive experience at Tully exploring feedback and review loops as well as teamwork under pressure. This coaching exchange was facilitated by the **Australian Institute of Sport**.





PATHWAY PROGRAM ACTIVITY

OVERVIEW

The previous 12 months has seen the Pathway team continuing to reinforce the training standards and communication with all high-performance programs across the country. This was achieved through continuous travel across the country as well as regular teleconferences. The state visits proved valuable to continue the connection to the local environment as well as providing valuable leadership and mentoring opportunities. The previous 12 months has also seen a restructure within the Pathways team with **Jamie** and **Naomi Fernandez** both resigning. This has lead to **Jason Lane** being appointed to the Head of Pathways and **John Hukins** appointed as a Senior High Performance Administrator (commencing in January 2024).

The following were highlights of the 2023 season:

- Continued delivery of the Pathway Pillars which underpin the overarching Pathways Framework, delivering simple, clear and consistent expectations with regards to training standards, principles, technical models etc.
- 25 crews taking to the water as part of the Interstate Schools Pathway Eight competition, held in conjunction with the Underage Trials event in Canberra during April. This event continues to grow annually, with all states now represented by two or more crews.
- Providing exposure to the NTC environment for targeted Pathway athletes as we look to build the 'team behind the team', for 2025 and beyond. The Pathway team conducted two camps early in the year and a further two in November and December, with the latter in conjunction with the National Time Trial in Penrith.

TEAM OVERVIEW

Junior and Under 23 World Championship Teams

The Under 19 Team competed at the **World Championships** in Paris, in August. This regatta also served as an Olympic test activity and attracted 615 competitors from 53 nations. Australia's team consisted of 6 crews. In challenging windy and wet conditions, the team demonstrated some great improvements in comparison to 2022. Three crews qualified for the A Final, with the remaining three crews all winning the B Final, meaning our worst result was 7th place at the regatta. Of the three A Final crews, U19 W4+, U19 W4+, U19 W2- the highlight was a bronze medal for the U19 W2-. The crew of **Lucy Richardson** and **Katie Jackson**, coached by **Jamie McDonald** were a regionally based crew that trained out of **Wendource Ballarat Rowing Club**. The crew demonstrated great composure throughout the regatta and raced with confidence in the final to claim the medal. **Overall Australia finished 9th on the medal table**.

The Under 23 Team competed at the **World Championships** in Plovdiv, Bulgaria in July. The regatta had 750 competitors from 51 nations. Australia was represented by eight crews at the regatta, which included two US Pathway crews, U23 M8+ and U23W4+. The team's performances were exceptional with every crew qualifying for the A Final with the worst result being a 4th place finish for three crews, U23 M8+, U23 M4+ and U23 LW1x. Five crews won medals at the regatta, U23 M4-, U23 M2-, U23 M4x, U23 W4- with one crew winning a gold medal, U23 W4+. The team also demonstrated great composure and resilience throughout the racing and was again a great performance improvement from 2022. **Australia finished 8th on the medal table**.

Under 21

The **2023 Trans-Tasman regatta** in June was held at Lake Karipiro, NZ. The AUS team were again dominate on the water winning all events with a clean sweep, thereby retaining the **Rusty Robertson trophy**.

Once again, the series allowed us to expose a new cohort of Pathway athletes and coaches to international racing, membership of the **Australian Rowing Team** and a better understanding of the standards and expectations this brings with it.

Other competitions

Australia also sent a team to the **2023 World University Games**, held in China. This is a clear development opportunity for a number of countries as the standard of the competition continues to improve as the Australian crews faced tough racing throughout the regatta. Fifteen athletes represented Australia at the regatta with three crews making the A Final, LW2x, W2x and mixed quad scull.

Australia was also invited to other international locations to compete against local crews. In May we sent a Men's and Women's Eight to compete at the **Windermere Cup in Washington USA**. This is the opening regatta of the season and provided a group of athletes that were too old to compete for the U23 team and had missed senior selection with valuable racing opportunities as well continued training.

Additionally, we were invited to compete in the **Shanghai Head** regatta in September. Again, a Men's and Women's Eight was sent to this regatta and competed over various distances and locations performing well at each distance winning both the long distance and sprint races for the men and women.

The results of all teams showed great improvements in all facets of performance and were a testament to the engagement of all coaches and their commitment to the pathway pillars. The increased standards and performance levels are continuing to develop athletes to progress through the pathway and ultimately ensure they are ready to transition into NTC programs in the next Olympic cycle.

PARA-ROWING PROGRAM

OVERVIEW

The competitive landscape in international para rowing continues to evolve and our Para-rowing program has provided new opportunities for para rowers and in 2023 saw some young and exciting rowers vying for and making the team. The gold medal in the PR3Mix2x demonstrates **RA** and our community's capacity and our current champions are fabulous role models for para rowers.

Domestically, Para-rowing continues to develop with continual growth in para-athlete representation in National, State and Club competition. Particular opportunity exists for further development in the PR1 and PR2 categories as well as women participating in the sport.

CLASSIFICATION

Rowing Australia continues to manage a team of National Technical and Medical Classifiers across the country. **Rowing Australia** provides one main classification opportunity each year which is a critical event for Para-rowing athletes as they come in to and continue in the sport.

BEACH SPRINT ROWING

Australia made its **World Beach Sprint Finals** debut at Barletta, Italy with **Marcus Della Marta** achieving Australia's best result racing in the quarter finals of the Coastal Men's Solo. There was a PR3 inclusive 2x exhibition race which was won by Australia's **Mac Russell** and **Phoebe Robinson**. This discipline continues to evolve, and **Rowing Australia** is grateful for the financial support the **Australian Institute of Sport** and **Commonwealth Games Australia** provides in supporting **RA** in providing opportunities for Australian Beach Sprint rowers.



The Rowing Australia Athletes' Commission (RAAC) was established to engage the athlete voice to help make the Australian Rowing Team the best in the world.

The RAAC is made up of three Men's, three Women's, two Para squad members, along with up to three retired athletes and one underage member. The RAAC aims to advocate on behalf of all high-performance athletes that are aspiring towards representing our country in rowing. As the chair of this commission, I have the privilege of a seat at the table of the Rowing Australia (RA) Board to make sure that athletes voices constructively contribute to progress of our organisation.

Strong lines of communication are at the core of a flourishing **Athletes' Commission**, and we believe this leads to a stronger RA. Over 2023 our squad leadership groups have communicated directly with the head coaches to create quick feedback loops for effective onthe-ground change, while bringing higher level issues to the **RAAC** for

thorough debate and discussion so that cohesive and outcome focused resolutions could be put to the executive and the board.

While strong communication from the athletes is crucial, without active engagement and the desire to listen to the athletes from the executive and the Board, we may as well be espousing to a brick wall. Throughout 2023, the engagement from the RA Board has been a key focus, and ultimately a highlight of the year. Additionally, the RA High-Performance Director Paul Thompson has been relentless in his pursuits to actively engage the RAAC in all significant decision making and ensuring that the athlete's representatives are considered and consulted at every turn.

Boat speed is really at the core of every athlete, and at the end of the day, the motivation behind our conversations within the RAAC is to answer the one simple question: What will make the boats go fastest? Whether it is discussing how good it is that the Under 23s get opportunities to test themselves alongside our senior team, the establishment of the Rowing

Australia Foundation, or the well-worn territory of the equitability of the trialling process, everything comes back to improving performance now, and long into the future.

Everything comes back to improving performance now, and long into the future.

The focus on performance throughout RA has been shown clearly by strong results across the 2023 international season, including medals across the World Cups and World Championships. Perhaps even more importantly for this cycle however, was the number of Paralympic and Olympic qualification places that we were able to achieve.

At the time of writing, we have selected three more boats to seek late qualification at the **Final Qualification Regatta**, and our qualified boats are deep in training

towards the pinnacle of our cycle, the **Paralympic** and **Olympic** games. Our tough summer of trialling and racing, including the **Australian Rowing Championships** on the Olympic course in Penrith, has set our team up with the confidence to take into the **World Cups** and the big dance in Paris.

The RAAC sits on the shoulders of the great staff and volunteers that make the Australian Rowing Team the force it is, and I would like to say an enormous thank you to them all. Our coaches, John Keogh, Ellen Randell, Tom Westgarth, Rhett Ayliffe, Lyall McCarthy, Mark Prater, Chad King, James Loveday, Laryssa Biesenthal and Hally Chapman; our High-Performance Director, Paul Thompson; our outgoing and incoming CEOs Ian Robson and Sarah Cook; the Chair of the High Performance Commission, Rachael Kininmonth OLY; the broader high performance team that are too numerous to name here; and lastly the RA board - in particular our Chair Rob Scott who has been a fundamental driving force behind this NTC era of training that has brought so much success to our team. Rob will be sorely missed when his tenure expires in 2024.

It is hard to put into words how our private industry partners have directly impacted the lives and competitive prospects of our Australian Rowing Team members. From Hancock Prospecting, who allows us to focus our lives around the Olympic and Paralympic pursuits; Bannister Downs and Inglewood Coffee who have (quite literally) fuelled our long hard days of training; Tempur who have given us perfect recovery between sessions; Bont Rowing who have built us rowing shoes capable of winning Olympic and Paralympic gold; and 776BC who have made us the best rowing kit in the world the impact this support has on our team members is deeply appreciated.

With a huge year ahead of us and everything on the line at the Paralympic and Olympic regattas, I wish the Australian Rowing team the best of luck on behalf of the RAAC.











EVENT & COMPETITION REPORT

Rowing Australia's event operations focused on the delivery of quality national events which are open to all Australian clubs and schools. There continues to be development through our national program in events, to better meet the needs of our rowing community. Our major events in 2023 were the Australian Rowing Championship, the Australian Masters Rowing Championships, the Australian Coastal Rowing and Beach Sprints Championships and the Australian Indoor Rowing Championships.



EVENTS

2023 AUSTRALIAN ROWING CHAMPIONSHIPS

27 MARCH- 2 APRIL 2023: CHAMPION LAKES, PERTH

Australia's premier rowing event, the **Australian Rowing Championships** (ARC) returned to Perth after an eleven-year hiatus. The first year back to normal after a number of interrupted events, the community thoroughly enjoyed returning to Perth. The event was well supported by the community, receiving huge entries nationwide, and the largest contingent of clubs and schools from Western Australia competing on record. The commitment from the local and rowing communities to make the event a success was fantastic, especially the workforce who came in droves to support the ARC.



Overall, **1861 competitors** from Australia and **35 international competitors** took part in the 129 events offered throughout the seven days of competition.

Key highlights of ARC 2023 include:

- Total cumulative event attendance of over 33,000 including competitors, team staff, exhibitors, spectator and volunteers.
- Seven days of livestream broadcast, attracting 205,000 viewers.
- Increased social media activity, delivering increased engagement and interaction across Instagram, X, Facebook and LinkedIn platforms.
- Revisiting WA meant that we had increased engagement with a new group of volunteers and workforce and used their knowledge, experience and local expertise to deliver the event.
- The media launch, held in Elizabeth Quay attracted major media outlets and provided a reach of over 10 million.
- The continuation of the "Learn and Load" for schools and the introduction of the Women's Breakfast were both great successes.
- RowUnion was thoroughly enjoyed by all who took advantage and the King's and Queens's Cups Reception were both enjoyed by all in attendance.

Rowing Australia thanks the entire event workforce for their dedication and enthusiasm to deliver such a high quality event, there was such pride in the event in WA. The group of Project Team members worked tirelessly and professionally to ensure a safe, fair and enjoyable event for all.

The support of **Rowing WA**, **Venues West**, the **City of Armadale**, **Tourism WA** and the **WA Government** was invaluable. The team at **Rowing WA** were wonderful to work with and we can't express our gratitude enough.

Finally, **Rowing Australia** congratulates all of the athletes and coaches who showcase our sport, the participants entertained the crowds over the seven days with thrilling racing which provided lasting memories for those involved.



The second **Australian Coastal Rowing and Beach Sprints Championships** (ACRBSC) which doubled up as an Oceania event, was held in Mooloolaba with the support of the **Sunshine Coast Council** and the **Mooloolaba Surf Life Saving Club**. The regatta was moved along the beach for the last two days after large waves were deemed to be too big for competition and the remainder of the event ran smoothly.

105 athletes competed at the regatta, seeing an increase from the previous year at Noosa, and building a good base for the discipline in Australia.

Many learnings are taken on again and we appreciate the assistance of our Boat Race Officials and the experience of **Cameron Allen** for his support and expertise by once again acting as Race Director.







AUSTRALIAN MASTERS ROWING CHAMPIONSHIPS

SYDNEY INTERNATIONAL REGATTA CENTRE PENRITH, NSW, 1-4 JUNE 2023

The 2023 Australian Masters Rowing Championships (AMRC) were held at the Sydney International Regatta Centre from 1 – 4 June 2023, there were 1020 athletes contesting 197 events over the four days of competition. A record number of seats were racing at 5310.

The competitors enjoyed being back in Sydney for the regatta after 8 years away. **Rowing NSW** did a great job delivering an exceptional event both on and off the water. We thank the many volunteers that assisted staff and our team of level 3 Boat Race Officials who ensured a safe and fair regatta.

COACH EDUCATION

Resources continue to be created for the rowing community with the release of the technical sculling poster featuring World Championship bronze medalist **Tara Rigney**. This complements the earlier released sweep poster featuring Olympic gold medalist **Jack Hargreaves**. These are both freely available to the rowing community.

The online **Coastal Coaching course** was also released. A new database for coaching accreditation was created.

Another **Level 3 coaching course** was delivered over 5 days at the **AIS** for 18 coaches. This was following a course in 2022 which meant that numbers were down as they are normally held biannually. The High Performance coaches and support staff gave detailed presentations covering the range of topics in the course. They openly shared their knowledge and answered questions. The days are long, but the collaborative discussions and sharing of information is so helpful for all involved.

The new database for coaches was developed. It allows coaches to create their personal record and importantly, keep their personal details updated. They upload their **Working with Vulnerable People** (WWVP) card, or equivalent, details there and **RA** staff add their coaching certificate to their individual record. This has proved to be a helpful improvement keeping the database as accurate as possible.



The following table shows the accredited coaches at 31 December 2023, with comparative figures from 2022 provided in brackets. There has been a drop in total accredited coach numbers, especially in the Level 1 course. However, the work done by the States in delivering the Level 2 one day workshop has resulted in a healthy 14% increase in accredited Level 2 coaches.

Working with **Paul Thompson** and our High Performance (HP) Team, the **HP Coach Development Strategy** has been finalised and started to be implemented. There is a project being developed to get a small number of successful experienced HP coaches working as Coach Developers with targeted HP Coaches. Efforts continue to engage more female coaches in the HP area of our sport. **Ron Batt** has been actively involved in the **AIS' Women in HP coaching** project. The work has included researching what 20 other sports are doing and then helping the project Team to create outcomes that can be delivered to enable more female coaches to be involved in HP sport.

Through the support of the **AIS** we have started to deliver **Individual Coach Development Plans** to a small number of targeted HP coaches. The **AIS** also supported our collaborative Professional Development work with the **Army's Combat Training Centre** (CTC). Four of their Officers spent a week visiting the **Men's and Women's National Training Centres** in April to view the process of developing athletes for the **Olympics**. Six months later 10 of RA's staff, the High-Performance Director, HP coaches, Participation and Education Manager and a member of the **AIS HP Coach Development Team** visited Tulli, Queensland to spend a week at the jungle **CTC camp**. We witnessed operations being carried out and learnt about the reflections and decision-making process in the CTC.

It is anticipated that the **Coastal Rowing Coaching add-on** will be in the presentation by two highly experienced soldiers on 'Leadership under pressure' was particularly impressive and moving, with some significant decisions being taken in a life and death situation under enemy fire.

Learning objectives

- Teamwork and collaboration
- Leadership under pressure
- Coping with pressure
- Connecting and reflecting to enable performance improvement.

A webinar was held in late 2023 with **Dr Allan Coles**. He chaired the committee that wrote the report that led to the creation of the **Als**. His work in academia has been impressive but so are his numerous national and world indoor rowing records at the spritely ageof 96. He is quite a remarkable man.

Rowing Australia continued its commitment to fostering the growth of indoor rowing across the nation in 2023. Through a strategic focus on digital innovations, community building, and increased participation, indoor rowing is reaching new heights of accessibility and engagement for athletes of all levels.















AUSTRALIAN INDOOR ROWING CHAMPIONSHIPS (AIRC)

The **2023 Australian Indoor Rowing Championships** (AIRC) exemplified the power of digital connectivity and the enduring spirit of the rowing community. Here are some key highlights:

- Global Appeal: attracting 511 competitors from 13 countries, AIRC23 demonstrated the event's growing international presence.
- Inclusivity: with 61 categories represented, the event welcomed rowers of all ages and abilities, including inspiring participation from senior athletes in the 85-89 age group.
- Community Hubs: in Canberra, Melbourne, Sunshine Coast, Tasmania, and the Anytime Fitness Kwinana fostered camaraderie and competition.
- Oceania Collaboration: the integrated Oceania Championships with New Zealand showcased the strength of the region's rowing community.
- **Technological Innovation:** features like the live platform, livestream, and dynamic hub interactions enhanced the virtual experience for athletes and spectators alike.

ANZAC DAY CHALLENGE

The **ANZAC Day Challenge** successfully combined remembrance with a spirit of competition. Rowers from across Australia and internationally rowed 2504 metres in honour of **ANZAC Day**. The **ACT Indoor Rowing Team** led the charge with exceptional participation and distances.

ROW NATION: INNOVATION AND GROWTH

Row Nation continues on a trajectory of innovation and growth, advancing **Rowing Australia**'s strategic goal of expanding participation in rowing. **Key milestones for 2023 include:**

- CEO Appointment: a suitably experienced CEO will be appointed in early 2023.
- Capital Raise Progress: Commitments from Rowing Australia, new investors, and ongoing alumni outreach underscore the strong support for this initiative.
- App Development: in partnership with Cleveroad, key features such as workout programs, enhanced user experience, and PM5 integration are now in place, with the updated app due for launch in June 2024.
- Olympic Opportunity: Row Nation is poised to leverage the global spotlight of the Olympics and Paralympics with a targeted marketing strategy.

Indoor rowing's growth under **Rowing Australia** shows immense promise. With a commitment to digital innovation, inclusivity, and strategic collaborations, we envision indoor rowing becoming a vibrant entry into the sport, attracting new participants and establishing itself as a dynamic fitness platform for the broader community.

THE HANCOCK PROSPECTING ROWER OF THE YEAR AWARDS

The **Rower of the Year Awards** was held in Canberra. This year a new category for **Service to Rowing** was introduced to acknowledge that service to the sport over a period of a number of years.

After the States and the rowing community nominated candidates, a small panel addressed the nominations against the criteria for each award. There were again some excellent nominations as we celebrate and thank, the passionate, hard-working people who help to keep our sport running.

SPORTING SCHOOLS - RIGGERS PROGRAM

Rowing Australia's Riggers program is funded by the Australian Sports Commission's (ASC) Sporting Schools Program.

This year we were able to deliver 5 of the requested 8 school programs.

COASTAL ROWING

The second **Australian Coastal Rowing and Beach Sprints Championships** were held in Mooloolaba during July.

Rowing Australia and Rowing Queensland with the support of the official equipment supplier Sykes Racing worked together to deliver an event where the participants turned up and were able to share boats and oars.

After the 6km Endurance race the focus was on the fast and exciting Beach Sprint format. Athletes sprint across the sand to get into their boats to race around a couple of buoys then sprint up the beach to reach the buzzer first.

The final race for the Open Mixed 4x was lost by the first rower to the buzzer when they dived and missed it allowing the other crew to buzz first and win by 0.6 of a second!

It's going to be an exciting addition to the **2028 Olympic Games**.

The online **Coastal Beach Sprint coaching course** has now been released and is available on the **RA** education portal:

The second Outback Regatta in Barcaldine and Longreach was held in September. Like the Coastal Nationals it uses a model of supplying the boats and oars, Eights in this case. The participants enjoyed a Henley style knock out event at Barcaldine on their new Recreation Lake over 800 metres on the Saturday. Followed by the unforgettable experience of glamping under the stars at the local Golf Club. Sunday was a 6km handicapped Head race on the Thomson River in Longreach. There were 'orphan crews' as well as numerous club crews racing from many of the States. It is quite an event and a rowing experience to be savoured. HERITAGE MATTERS

The **Louis Petrin** collection of rowing memorabilia going back to the 1850's is now on loan from his family to **RA** and is housed in **RA's** Canberra offices. Bookings will be available in 2024 to come and view it. There are over 2300 rowing books, trophies, tankards, as well as old clothing, some oars and numerous rowing items, including **Olympic** ones. It is a magnificent collection that took Louis many years to collect.

RA is supporting the Women in Rowing History project. The small dedicated group are sourcing any documents, photos and reports etc to do with women rowing in Australia. There are large gaps in the documented history of women rowing in Australia and this group are keen to address this by finding and copying items so they can be collated, and a full history recorded. 

JOHN (JACK) F MORGANTI

Jack learned his rowing at St Patricks at Ballarat and joined Mercantile in the early 1950s. He won two King's Cup races in 1956 and 1958 and was reserve for the Olympic crews in 1956.

He remembers well the post war years where he learned so much from the exserving members. Norm Cairnes who had been through so much at Toobruk and who played down any mention of it. Laurie Moll who took a soldier settlement block and Mercs members spent weekends there on working bees. He does not remember fondly marking lambs with Crockett! Jim Ferguson who would break into song with Gilbert and Sullivan arias. Sadly other rowers were unable to shake off the effects of war with his friend Paddy Barrett dying early.

He also remembers fondly the country regattas. In particular one Easter regatta in 1955 when Bob Aitken convinced them to race at Mildura in order to win the Club premiership from Albert Park. Herb Shears managed the group and they won the premiership.

Jack and his wife Jone were the guests of your correspondent in the Henley enclosure in 2020 where he gained these valuable insights

At the time of his death in 2023, Jack had been living in Queensland for the last 50 years but he has visited the club a number of times on regular trips to Melbourne.

His son David advised that he remained very proud of his rowing achievements throughout his life including his years at Mercantile and of course features in the Club's history.

He died peacefully on the morning of 3 February 2023 after a short illness.

HARALD JAHRLING

Jahrling rowed and coached for East Germany across multiple Olympic cycles, winning two Gold medals at the 1976 Montreal and 1980 Moscow Olympics as an athlete before German unification in 1989.

Following his tim e in Germany, Harald made the move to Australia where he has held a number of roles, including leading the NSWIS Rowing Program and working for Rowing Australia. He coached Australian crews at a number of World Championships and the 1996 Atlanta, 2000 Sydney and 2004 Athens Olympic Games.

Harald's son Rob has also had a decorated rowing career for Australia, competing at three Olympic Games including as a member of the Men's Eight crew that won a Silver medal at the 2000 Games in Sydney.

Rowing Australia passes on its deepest condolences to Harald's family and the many friends he made across the wider rowing community.

Harold passed away on 18 May 2023.

JENNY BEER

Jenny is a stalwart of the Australian Rowing Championships since 2013 and known to everyone who passed through the site offices to collect accreditation, parking, lost property or to see a friendly face and be spoiled with baked treats.

She is the mother of Swan River Rowing Club Head Coach Mark Beer and sister of former Rowing Australia staffer Clare Phillips. Jenny is also known to every athlete who sought medical treatment at the Australian Institute of Sport from 1997-2015, when she was the Sports Science Sports Medicine receptionist.

Jenny, who passed away on 29 May 2023, will be sadly missed and Rowing Australia extends its deepest condolences to Jenny's family and friends.

ROBERT 'BOB' HEMERY

Bob Hemery was an energetic, innovative and entrepreneurial rowing administrator. He commenced a full life in sports administration from when he left school.

It is argued that he did his best work in his home State of WA where he was able to fund raise, introduce innovations such a regatta control board and boat race official training, and participate fully in both rowing and local Olympic affairs. His term as an administrator was not without controversy as he unafraid to express his views.

The following extracts from Bill Coopers history of rowing in Western Australia, Home and Dry, published by Rowing WA in 2008 provides some hints of this innovative work.

His fund raising for the 1964 team was impressive organising a Miss Rowing Quest, a lavish King's Cup Ball and a Ring and Give appeal on Radio Station 6TZ.

The 1971 annual report of ARAWA reported: The long-range plan evolved by Messrs Hemery and Saunders is progressing towards its ultimate aim. [Furthermore, crew-member] Peter Shakespear is the first Western Australia to row in an Olympic Games four-oared crew.

Bob was also heavily involved in the sport of weightlifting, including Board membership of that federation in the years following his rowing administrator career.

He passed away on 21 October 2023.

ERIC WALLER

Rowing Australia has paid tribute to the innovative and tireless contribution of Eric Waller, a former rower, coach, administrator and race official credited with lifting the standard of regattas around the country.

Eric, who passed away on 9 June 2023, after a long illness, was described as a gentleman of Australian rowing. Humble but spirited, respectful but determined, collaborative but persistent, he served the sport with skill and enthusiasm at all levels and across almost six decades.

It was his work on regattas, however, that will be remembered as his greatest contribution. Eric understood regattas were events, and greatly improved the standard of state and national level competitions over a 30-year period.

He took on the Field of Play role for at least eight national regattas and at international events held in Victoria, and founded an association of Australian boat drivers, the team going on to work on the 1990 World Championships and the Sydney Olympics. Due to the professionalism and camaraderie of this group, there was a queue of people wanting to join.

Eric was capable of getting things done while others were still talking about what to do. Credit for his work never crossed his mind; it was the lifting of standards which brought him joy.

Rowing Australia sends its condolences to Eric's family and thanks him for a lifetime dedicated to our wonderful sport.

SERVICE TO ROWING AWARD

Mrs Gina Rinehart AO

Mrs Rinehart was named as the first winner of the Service to Rowing Award, which honours a member of the rowing community who has made a significant and enduring contribution to the sport. She was presented with the award by Rowing Australia President Rob Scott.

THE GINA RINEHART AO ROWING LEADERSHIP AWARDS

Jed Altschwager, Tara Rigney OLY

Jed Altschwager and Tara Rigney OLY shone as the dual recipients of the Gina Rinehart AO Rowing Leadership Award. Their exemplary leadership in the world of rowing earned them both this award.

PARA CREW OF THE YEAR

PR3 Mixed Double Scull (Jed Altschwager, Nikki Ayers PLY)

Jed and Nikki swept all before them this year in a series of dominant performances in the PR3 Mixed Double scull. They took Gold in the International Para Regatta, Gold in two World Cups before capping off a remarkable racing season with Gold at the World Rowing Championships, punching the ticket for the boat for Paris 2024 in the process.

FEMALE CREW OF THE YEAR:

Women's Pair (Jessica Morrison OAM, Annabelle McIntyre OAM)

Jess and Annabelle won Gold in the Four in Tokyo and have now become one of the elite crews in the Women's Pair. They enjoyed a stellar European season, winning Gold at two World Rowing Cups then Silver at the World

Rowing Championships in Belgrade. The precision on the water is a thing of beauty

and they are shaping to once again be major players as they work towards another Olympic Games.

MALE CREW OF THE YEAR

Men's Coxed Eight

The selfless mentality that has been driving the Men's Eight would see this boat create history in 2023. They would power to a famous victory at World Cup III in Lucerne to beat arch-rivals Great Britain, and in doing so break a 36-year drought to bring home Australia's first Gold Medal for the boat since 1986. They would go on to claim Bronze at the World Rowing Championships and take another step in 'The Project' that has been brewing at the Men's National Training Centre in Canberra.

PARA COACH OF THE YEAR

Chad King

Chad King started his tenure as Paralympic Head Coach of Rowing Australia in December 2022 and his impact has been immediate and profound. He has been the mastermind of some brilliant performances on the international stage and coaches the World Champion PR3 Mixed Double and Paralympic great Erik Horrie in the PR1 Men's Single Scull.

COACH OF THE YEAR

John Keogh

John Keogh is the Women's Head Coach and leads the program for the Women's Pair and the Women's Eight, with both crews on track for memorable 2024 campaigns after excellent growth and performances in 2023. John is an energetic and driven mentor at the Hancock Prospecting Women's National Training Centre in Penrith.

VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR

Mike Angus

Mike Angus has been a tireless and dedicated contributor on a volunteer basis for Australian rowing for more than a decade. He has become one of the best and most dependable boat drivers in the country, whether it be for Rowing NSW at school and club level or at a national level for both flat water and coastal rowing. He is regularly the first person on the water and last person off the water and does it all with his customary smile and positive attitude.

OFFICIAL OF THE YEAR

Caroline Schomberg

Caroline Schomberg has been a rowing official for almost 30 years and regularly works at state regattas, often as the President of the Jury. She has been a regular member of National Juries for Rowing Australia at the full range of RA regattas including Coastal Rowing in both

Caroline was President of the Jury for the National Rowing Championships in 2022 and has been a vital member of the RA Umpires Committee for five years.

Caroline's work as an international umpire has included the full range of World Rowing regattas in many countries since 2012. More recently, her abilities have been recognised and rewarded by her appointment by the International Olympic Committee to the Olympic Rowing Jury in Paris 2024.







COMMONWEALTH GAMES AUSTRALIA BEACH SPRINT CREW OF THE YEAR

Marcus Della Marta

Marcus Della Marta has marked himself as one of the rising stars of rowing's new discipline, taking out the Open Men's Beach Sprint Solo at the Australian Coastal Rowing and Beach Sprints Championships and being selected for the Australian team to compete at the World Championships in Italy, where he stood tall against the best athletes from around the globe and made it to the quarter finals, only beaten by the eventual champion.

77BC ROWER'S ROWER OF THE YEAR

Jed Altschwager

This award caps off a remarkable year for Jed, who has inspired with not just his ability on the water but his leadership, support and commitment to his crew mates and teammates. His story is one of resilience, of never giving up and of making the most of every chance. It is one that clearly resonates strongly with his peers and mates in the **Australian Rowing Team**, which is why he is the deserved winner of this special award.

BOLLE PATHWAYS CREW OF THE YEAR

U23 Men's Four

The Under 23 Men's Four produced a sensational series of rows at the U23 World Rowing Championships, culminating in a thrilling showdown with Great Britain in the A Final. The Australians set the pace early then settled in for a classic neckand-neck struggle in the second half of the race. They would walk away with a hard-earned Silver Medal and the promise of great things on the horizon.

PATHWAYS COACH OF THE YEAR

Jamie McDonald

Jamie McDonald has been a vision of expertise, experience, and unwavering commitment to the growth and success of athletes at the Wendouree Ballarat Rowing Club. This year, he was able to guide the club duo of Katie Jackson and Lucy Richardson to a Bronze Medal in challenging conditions at the U19 World Rowing Championships in Paris.

BONT CLUB OF THE YEAR

Fremantle Rowing Club

Fremantle Rowing Club's exceptional dedication to building their community and serving the wider development of our sport, in addition to their historymaking 2023 season, makes them a worthy recipient of this award. The club's ethos is to promote rowing not just in their shed but across the community and wholeheartedly embraced both Indoor and Coastal Rowing - establishing, developing and hosting the WA State Indoor Championships. For the first time in the state's history, Fremantle won the Championship Open Women's Eight at State Championships. This thrilling outcome was a true representation of the entire club's efforts - their coaching team and committee had a clear vision for their program and followed it like a north star through thoughtful systems and decisions.



ROWING AUSTRALIA LIFE MEMBER INDUCTEE

Life Membership is the highest honour afforded to those involved in rowing in Australia. It is reserved for those who have demonstrated significant, sustained and high-quality service that enhances the reputation and future of rowing by virtue of their considerable contribution to the sport nationally



DR CHRIS GRUMMITT

This year, the **Rowing Australia Board and Council** awarded Life Membership to Chris Grummitt, who has been a fixture on the Australian scene in a host of roles since he began rowing at **Brisbane Boys College** in 1981.

Chris earned a scholarship at the **Australian Institute of Sport** and also went on to have a successful career as a club, state and national coxswain, school, club and state coach and state and national administrator. He coached Queensland's only winning **Queen's Cup** crew and is only one of two people to cox and coach a **King's Cup** crew.

But Chris' greatest work for the sport has been his part in the revolutionising regatta management technology in Australia, from simple timing systems to the integrated system which now comprises the all-inclusive sports presentation package. He currently holds the position of Regatta Technology Manager for **Rowing Australia**.

BOARD UPDATES

There were also important movements on the **Rowing Australia Board**, with current Director **Ben Dodwell** (McVilly-Pearce Pin number 481) re-elected to his post.

Ben is a triple-Olympian who has provided the Board with vast corporate experience as a leading funds manager and has made strong contributions as a member of the Audit and Risk Committee and Chair of the Renumerations and Nominations Committee.

Rowing Australia welcomes Richard Finlayson to a Director role. Richard, McVilly-Pearce Pin number 397, first represented Australia in 1987 (Men's Coxed Four) and was in the squad for the Men's Eight at the **Seoul Olympic Games** in 1988 before embarking on a successful career in broadcasting.

He was the Chief Operating Officer of

SBS from 2009-2013 before joining ABC as its Director of Television until 2017. He is currently the Director and Joint Chief Executive Officer of independent production house Wooden Horse.

Richard will serve in the Directorship vacated by **Bryan Weir**, who has stood down from governance duties.

Bryan has been a tireless servant to the sport of rowing and from May of 2015, the Rowing Australia Board. As an

athlete, Bryan represented Australia in the Men's Coxless Pair in the World Rowing Championships in Lucerne in 1974 and was part of the New South Wales King's Cup Eight in 1976.

Before joining Rowing Australia, he was Deputy President of Rowing New South Wales, Board Member of the Sydney International Rowing Regatta and President of Mosman Rowing Club.

Outside of rowing, Bryan has been a partner at law firm **Freehills**, a divisional director at **Macquarie Bank**, operated a private investment advisory group and remains a Director at **L.J. Hooker Ltd.**

Rowing Australia President **Rob Scott** paid tribute to Bryan's dedication and service on the Board and ongoing passion for the sport.



Rowing Australia is better for the significant expertise, advice and dedication Bryan has contributed during his long and fruitful tenure on our Board. On behalf of the Rowing Australia Board, Council and the wider rowing community, I would like to thank Bryan for his support and guidance during some transformational and challenging times across the sport. I would also like to welcome Richard to the Board and am looking forward to leveraging his expertise and input as we embark down the crucial Green and Gold Runway towards a Brisbane Olympic and Paralympic Games.

And it gives me great pleasure to congratulate Chris on his Life Membership of Rowing Australia. He joins a distinguished group and richly deserves the honour after decades of dedication and innovation across the sport. Thank you once again to the State Councillors, Presidents and Chief Executives who joined us for the AGM and I look forward to working together further as we enter a hugely exciting time for rowing ahead of Paris 2024."

2023 AUSTRALIA DAY HONOURS

Rowing Australia extends its congratulations to **Bob Duncan** after the 1956 Olympian and decorated official was included in the **Australia Day Honours List for 2023**. Duncan was one of just two Olympians in this year's list and has been awarded a **Medal of the Order of Australia** (OAM) for services to the sport.

Three other members of the rowing community – **Raymond Smith** (OAM), **Stephen Cornelissen** (AM) and **Anthony Boyd** (OAM) – were also featured.

Rowing Australia Chief Executive Ian Robson said.

Bob is an iconic figure in Australian rowing and richly deserves this accolade after decades of commitment to our sport both as a competitor, umpire, historian and author, He has been a dedicated servant across all levels of rowing and rose to become a highly respected umpire both domestically and at the highest tiers of the sport internationally. Rowing Australia sends its sincere congratulations to Bob and thanks him for an immense contribution to the sport that spanned more than half a century."

Bob began rowing at **Mercantile** and **Wesley College** in 1945 and went on to row in the coxed pairs at the **1956 Olympic Games** in Melbourne.

Soon after, he put down the oars to begin what would be a trailblazing path as an umpire. After establishing himself as a leading Australian official, Bob sat his **FISA** exams in 1988, before taking his place as a judging co-ordinator at the 1990 **World Championships** at **Lake Barrington**, then as an umpire in 1991.

At the **1995 World Championships** in Finland, Bob became the first Australian umpire to start races at that level, including being given the honour of starting finals. Such has been his influence that in 2010, **Rowing Victoria** created the **Bob Duncan Award** for services to umpiring.

Raymond Smith is a decorated pathways coach and life member and head coach of the Pine Rivers Rowing Club in south-east Queensland, which he joined in 1980 after moving north from Victoria, where he coached successfully at the Essendon Rowing Club.

He is a former member of the management committee for **Rowing Queensland**, former selector and coach at multiple levels, including guiding the Australian women's U19s Pair and Quad in 2022, the women's U19 Double Scull in 2021 and 2022 and the men's U23 Pair and Four in 1992.

He was also a coaching mentor at rowing nursery **St Joseph's Nudgee College** from 2011-2017.

Stephen Cornelissen, an aged care leader and committee member at Merton Hall Rowing Club in 2019, was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) for significant service to community health while Brother Anthony Boyd (former rowing coach, St Joseph's College Hunter's Hill) was made an OAM for services to secondary education.

Rowing Australia also acknowledges **Sam Parker** (freestyle featherweight wrestling, Rome, 1960), who was the other Olympian to be honoured with an **OAM**.

KING'S BIRTHDAY HONOUR LIST

Several members of the Rowing Australia family have been recognised for their services to the sport and excellence in other fields as part of the 2023 King's Birthday Honours list.

Former Rowing Australia (RA) President and Rowing Australia Life Member, the Hon. Patrick McNamara, was honoured with the Membership of the Order of Australia (AM) for significant services to rowing, the Parliament of Victoria and to the community in a variety of roles.

McNamara, a former Deputy Premier of Victoria, was pivotal in developing the rowing course at Nagambie, increasing government funding to Rowing Australia, and even making his local rowing club in Nagambie a commercial success. He spent nine years as RA President and is also a former President of Rowing Victoria.

Former RA Director Sally Capp was inducted as an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO) for her distinguished

service to the people of Melbourne, to local government as Mayor of Melbourne and to the community through various organisations including **Rowing Australia**.

Another past RA Director, Andrew Guerin, who also chaired the RA Umpires Committee, was past President of both Rowing Victoria and Mercantile Rowing Club, and also is our rowing historian, was acknowledged with a Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) for services to rowing and sports history.

Other inductions into Membership of the Order of Australia (AM) include prominent Sydney University Boat Club member Jane Spring for significant service to disability advocacy in sport and to public service administration, and Reeconian and Ulverston Rowing Clubs member Roger Blake, who was recognised for his significant work in sport as a competitor, administrator, and statistician.

Medals of the Order of Australia were awarded to several prominent rowers including Anne Caterson for her services to life saving and Simon Pennington for his services to rowing as a competitor and coach in New South Wales.

Richard Sivyer was inducted for his services to rowing and to the community which included his work at St Josephs College – Gregory Terrace in Queensland. Peter Stroud of Drummoyne Rowing Club was inducted for his services to rowing as a competitor, coach, selector, and administrator.

Sydney University Boat Club members were again recognised with another prominent member, Anne Titterton, being inducted for her services to rowing. Murray Bridge Rowing Club member Ken Wells was recognised for his services to the community of Murray Bridge.





REPORTS AROUND THE STATES









ROWING AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY

It has been another successful year of rowing in the nation's capital, between our local suite of regattas for all levels to our high performing athletes on the Australian Rowing Team.

On a national level, it was fantastic to see so many local clubs and schools make their way across the Nullabor to compete at the **Australian Rowing Championships** in Perth. At the **Interstate Regatta**, 2023 saw the return of the ACT to the **Queen's Cup** after 13 years whilst **Nikki Ayers PLY** continued her golden run taking out the **PR3 Women's Interstate Single**, and **Caleb Antill** showed his continued class earning silver in the **President's Cup**, after becoming the first ACT male to win the **Open Men's single** earlier in the week.

In the pathways crews, our **School's Pathways Athletes** proved the future is strong with 4th and 5th place respectively from our school girl and school boy eights.

Our Masters athletes also showed their skill with all three of our Masters Interstate Crews making the podium at the Interstate Regatta at the Australian Masters Rowing Championships. Legend of the sport Sue Donoghue made it two from two in the Women's PR3 Interstate Single, whilst Stuart John claimed silver. Our women's quad went out strong but were pipped for the gold, still picking up a tidy silver medal.

Great form to our local talent was rewarded with Nikki Ayers PLY (Capital Lakes Rowing Club), Caleb Antill (ANU Boat Club), Anneka Reardon (ANU Boat Club) and Kendall Brodie (Canberra Grammar School Head Coach) all securing spots on the 2023 Australian Rowing Team. Nikki Ayers PLY continued her golden year, being undefeated throughout the international season, culminating with a gold medal in the World Rowing Championships. He incredible success was highlighted in the Canberra Sporting scene as she took out the CBR Sport Awards Para Athlete of the Year and Female Athlete of the Year. Kendall Brodie steered the Men's eight onto the podium at every event they raced, including a gold medal at World Cup II. Caleb Antill held strong in the men's quad whilst Anneka Reardon maintained her class in the Women's lightweight double. On the officiating side, local umpires Catherine Garrington and Nick Hunter both represented on the international stage at the Under 23 World Rowing Championships and Virtual Member of the Indoor Rowing Championships respectively, with Geoff Northam was a reserve for the World Championships.

Locally, there was a full spectrum of events for all athletes. The 2023 Winter series showed the success of school athletes, whilst off the water, Rowing ACT played host to a Veteran's and Families Indoor Rowing Competition, as well the inaugural ACT Indoor Rowing Championships, all of which was leading up to the 2023 Australian Indoor Rowing Championships, with a local hub at Canberra Girls Grammar School.

On the regatta course, we have continued to see the growth of our local regattas, with over 1000 seats at the **CGS regatta** in December 2023, something which we haven't previously seen much of in the ACT in the last few years but hope to see more of in the future.

On a governance side, we have farewelled **Thomas Creber** as an assistant coach and **Stuart John** who stepped in as Acting Executive Officer, whilst **Alison Chinn, Vinhara Goonesekera, Ben Page** and **Craig Jones** have all stepped back as Directors of the Rowing ACT Board. We have welcomed **Jaime Fernandez OLY, Alice Arch, Hugo Ellwood and Peter Wright** to the Rowing ACT Board, whilst **Sarah Davoren and Dave Fraumano** hold the fort within our staffing ranks.

We would also like to thank all our Clubs, schools, coaches and volunteers for their efforts throughout the year. It's no secret that Canberra can get a bit cold, so everyone's dedication to the sport is appreciated.

ROWING VICTORIA

On behalf of the **Rowing Victoria** (RV) Board, I am pleased to present the **Rowing Victoria** State Report for 2023.

The 2023 Victorian rowing season was filled will much success and excitement, however it certainly was not without its challenges. For a third year in a row, the regatta season started on the wrong oar with many regattas cancelled due to widespread flooding. Once again, the Victorian rowing community's resilience, adaptability, and strength overcame these challenges and overall membership numbers continued to increase

In partnership with Rowing Australia and our High-Performance Clubs, MUBC and Mercantile, with support from the Victorian Institute of Sport, and directed by Head Coach Noel Donaldson, Victorian athletes filled 29% of the available international representative seats! And again punched above their weight!

RV's Underage athletes also shone on the world stage! At the U23 World Championships 7 Victorian athletes supported by 3 Victorian coaches medalled. At the World Championships, Victorians claimed silver and bronze medals with seven crews securing Paris 2024 qualifications and at the U19 World Championships, Katie Jackson and Lucy Richardson and coached by Jamie McDonald, took out a bronze medal with a thrilling come from behind win. Congratulations to all involved; from the schools, clubs, coaches, the NTCs in Canberra and Penrith, and ultimately the athletes and their families.

At the **National and Interstate Championships**, **Rowing Victoria** was very proud of our athletes' performance, with wins in the **Queen's Cup** and **Penrith Cup** and by the Women's Pathway (U18)

RV continued to work collaboratively with **Rowing Australia** and other state sporting associations throughout the year to improve our sport, ensure compliance with increasing regulatory requirements and grow participation with innovative programs such an indoor rowing and **Row Nation**. Compliance obligations and corporate governance requirements are evolving and increasing for all sports. **RV** continues to look for ways to assist Clubs in adopting and complying with new requirements including the **National Integrity Framework** and Child Safety policies.

Over 40 regattas and events were held in Victoria this season. This was possible due to the on-going support of our Government stakeholders including the **State Government**, City of Ballarat, City of Geelong, City of Melbourne, Strathbogie Shire, Department of Sport and Recreation, Department of Health, Parks Victoria, and Transport Safety Victoria and their commitment to improvements to our waterways. Grants were obtained to up-grade the infrastructure and facilities at the National Watersport Centre at Carrum, Barwon River, Albert Park Lake, and Torquay – Fisherman's Beach.

Volunteers put the V in the Big V! Thank you to all our volunteers, umpires and regatta hosts for your flexibility and tireless efforts in ensuring that safe and fun environments and fair racing opportunities are provided for the community. We couldn't do it without you!

Sadly, the rowing community lost a number of all respected members this year including a rowing legend in the passing of **Eric Waller**. Through his 30 years plus of service and dedication to rowing, the standard of state and national level competitions were greatly improved. His contributions live on!

At this AGM, **Leanne Ambrose** will be retiring from the Board after six years of service, including two years as Deputy President. **Alicia Ivory** will also be retiring following her three-year term. Both Leanne and Alicia made valuable contributions to the Board throughout their tenures, participating in numerous Sub-Committees. Thank you so much Leanne and Alicia for your dedication and efforts. It is much appreciated.

To ensure that the Board has the appropriate skills, experience and diversity to best service the rowing community and sport, an extensive recruiting process was undertaken to identify two appointed Directors. **Chris Ohlrich** and **Lawrence Robertson** both of whom bring a range of commercial skills underpinned by strong understanding of the sport industry were the successful candidates and will be appointed at the AGM so that their terms coincide with that of member elected Directors. Welcome aboard, Chris and Lawrence.

After three years at RV, **Ian Jickell** has stepped down from his role as CEO. We are grateful to Ian for his leadership during this time, and it is important to note some of Rowing Victoria's achievements under his leadership including developing new competition formats, securing and successfully co-hosting and hosting the **2022 Australian Rowing Championships** and **Australian Masters Rowing Championships**, developing new competition and participation opportunities to ensure members could continue to engage in the sport through two COVID and one flood interrupted seasons, and implement key governance policies to ensure a safe and inclusive environment for the rowing community is provided . On behalf of the Board, we wish lan well for the future.

During this process, we welcome **Adam Harrison** as acting CEO, and look forward to working collaboratively with Adam for a successful 23/24 season.

Through two COVID and one flood interrupted seasons, RV was able to reverse the 10-year decline in participation and competitions numbers through the sport. We also saw new competition formats introduced, revenue streams diversified, and implementation of the current 3-year strategic plan commenced. These are significant achievements and I want to assure you that the Board's commitment to our mission; to be a leading, sustainable rowing organisation for community and performance, remains steadfast.

ROWING WESTERN AUSTRALIA

Last year we forecast that 1500 rowers would descend on **Champion Lakes** for the **2023 Australian Rowing Championships**, and we were wrong by quite a margin! Instead WA hosted the largest ever **National Championships** attracting 1900 rowers! This included over 400 WA rowers, a ten-fold increase on 2022, as local clubs and schools took the opportunity of the first home nationals in 11 years. Our faith in the WA rowing volunteer community was more than warranted with a volunteer army of boat holders, spectator services, boat rack installers, boat park managers, medal presentation assistants, ticket scanners and catering support staff rising to the occasion and rolling out WA's traditional welcome mat. In so doing, **Champion Lakes** has now truly earned its place as a go-to venue for future national and international regattas.

2023 was the first full year of operation of **The Rowing Pavilion** bar/restaurant at the **Canning Bridge Rowing Centre**. The facility has exceeded our expectations as the new meeting point for rowing in WA and a place to showcase rowing to a whole new market. **Fremantle Rowing Club, West Australian Rowing Club**, and **ANA Rowing Club** have developed similar "shop fronts" in the last decade thereby enhancing the rowing experience for their members and exposing our sport to venue patrons like never before.

Western Australian rowers continued to perform well on the national and international stage with 4 women and 3 men holding spots in the national high performance training centres. 2023 was a significant year for the **Australian Rowing Team** as crews vied for qualification spots for the **2024 Paris Olympics**, successfully qualifying 4 boats. International regattas in 2024 will provide an opportunity to qualify more. This sets the stage for an exciting and successful Olympic campaign to rival the 2021 Games.

Continuing success of WA rowers and coaches who earned selection in the Under 23 and Under 19 national teams is testament to the strong partnership between Rowing WA, Rowing Australia, the Western Australian Institute of Sport and our Pathway Partner Clubs to deliver excellence in high performance rowing. With this, the future is bright.

On the home front, it was another busy School, Pennant and Masters regatta season. The All Schools program continued to grow driven by the inclusion of Guildford Grammar School, Iona Presentation College and the new Making Waves Rowing Club. Rowing WA has created a full-time Schools Development role which will commence in 2024 with the objective of working with rowing clubs to expand the reach of rowing into even more non-traditional rowing schools.

Participation in Masters' regattas was again strong, and 2023 also saw the successful return of corporate rowing to the regatta calendar, which attracted significant media coverage. On the other hand, Pennant regattas participation was weaker than in recent years. This is, at least in part, attributable to the lost years of school rowers adversely impacted by event cancellations in 2020 and 2021. With school Heads of the River regattas back to full strength in 2023, it is hoped that the pipeline of competitive rowers will also return to full strength and boost Pennant regatta participation. Once again this year, I acknowledge the hard work, dedication and commitment of Club Presidents, Club Committees, the RWA Competitions Committee, RWA staff, and Boat Race Officials that delivered the core program of events through a very busy year. The Making Waves program had another successful year, under the stewardship of Keely Atchison, with over 500 students participating in the program which was again capped off with a oneweek rowing camp in December. It was also the first year in which graduates of the program raced in All Schools regattas with strong results and multiple podium finishes. The Making Waves fleet will be expanded in 2024 with the purchase of four single sculls, two double sculls/pairs and two quad sculls/fours, made possible thanks to the significant support from Wesfarmers, Wintech and our philanthropic donors. This will enable the program to grow its offering into after-school rowing and competitive rowing.

Our sport is blessed to have such a committed and highly capable team of **Rowing WA** staff, led by energetic and innovative CEO, **Daniel Tackenberg**, and supported by the hardworking and extremely capable General Manager Operations, **Sarah Black**. Sarah leaves the role to return to Tasmania in late 2023 and will be sorely missed by us all. Despite this and as a testament to the resilience and maturity of the team, and especially **Isabelle Day**, there has been a seamless transition to new General Manager – Operations, WA rowing stalwart, **Nick Wakeford**.

Let me also thank my fellow Board members who have worked tirelessly throughout the year on Board and committee work. Let me especially acknowledge the work of **Simon Cubitt OAM** who retires from the Board in 2024 after 8 years as Treasurer. In his signature calm and professional manner, Simon has steered the finances of **Rowing WA** to a new level of governance. I would also like to thank **Craig James OAM** and **Genevieve Cleary** who spearheaded the detailed and thankless task of rewriting the Constitution during 2023.

Rowing in WA is in good shape and ripe for growth.





NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

31 DECEMBER 2023

The financial report covers Rowing Australia Limited as an individual entity. Rowing Australia Limited is a company limited by guarentee, incorporated and domiciled in Australia.

The principal activities of the Company for the year ended 31 December 2023 were the administration of the sport of rowing in Australia. Rowing Australia Limited is a not-for-profit for financial reporting purposes.

The functional and presentation currency of Rowing Australia Limited is Australian dollars.

The financial report was authorised for issue by the Directors on 24 April 2024.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

Amounts in the financial statements and Directors' Report have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

NOTE 1 - BASIS OF PREPARATION

In the Directors' opinion, the Company is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. This special purpose financial report has been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the Corporations Act 2001.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 107 Statement of Cash Flows, AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors and AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures. The Company does not comply with the requirements of AASB 10 'Consolidated Financial Statements'.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

Going concern

These financial statements have been prepared on the assumption that the company is a going concern and will continue its operations for the foreseeable future.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A) REVENUE AND OTHER INCOME

Revenue from contracts with customers

The core principle of AASB 15 is that revenue is recognised on a basis that reflects the transfer of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration the Company expects to receive in exchange for those goods or services.

Generally the timing of the payment for sale of goods and rendering of services corresponds closely to the timing of satisfaction of the performance obligations, however where there is a difference, it will result in the recognition of a receivable, contract asset or contract liability.

None of the revenue streams of the Company have any significant financing terms as there is less than 12 months between receipt of funds and satisfaction of performance obligations.

Specific revenue streams

The revenue recognition policies for the principal revenue streams of the Company are:

Grant Revenue

Revenue from grants is recognised either on receipt of the funds, where there are no identifiable on-going performance obligations, or over time where there are identifiable and specific performance obligations set out in the contract. The Company recognises a contract liability for consideration received in respect of unsatisfied performance obligations and reports these amounts as other liabilities in the Statement of Financial Position.

Sponsorship

Revenues from sponsorship is recognised over time when specific performance obligations are satisfied.

Sale of goods

Revenue from the sale of goods and services is recognised at a point in time when the Company has dispatched goods or provided the service, as this corresponds to the satisfaction of the performance obligation under the contract and the customer obtains control of the asset.

Volunteer services

The Company regularly receives volunteer services as part of its operations. Under AASB 1058, private sector not-for-profit entities have a policy option to account for donated services at fair value if the fair value can be reliably measured.

While the Company has assessed that the fair value of its volunteer services can be reliably measured, it has decided to adopt the policy option not to recognise volunteer services. Accordingly, no amounts are recognised in the financial statements for volunteer services.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the relevant performance obligation is satisfied. All revenue is stated net of the amount of Goods and Services Tax (GST).

Other income - interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL POSITION BALANCES RELATING TO REVENUE RECOGNITION

Contract assets and liabilities

Where the amounts billed to customers are based on the achievement of various milestones established in the contract, the amounts recognised as revenue in a given period do not necessarily coincide with the amounts billed to or certified by the customer.

When a performance obligation is satisfied by transferring a promised good or service to the customer before the customer pays consideration or the before payment is due, the Company presents the contract as a contract asset, unless the Company's rights to that amount of consideration are unconditional, in which case the Company recognises a receivable.

When an amount of consideration is received from a customer prior to the entity transferring a good or service to the customer, the Company presents the contract as a contract liability.

Contract cost asset

The Company recognises assets relating to the costs of obtaining a contract and the costs incurred to fulfil a contract or set up / mobilisation costs that are directly related to the contract provided they will be recovered through performance of the contract.

Costs to obtain a contract

Costs to obtain a contract are only capitalised when they are directly related to a contract and it is probable that they will be recovered in the future. Costs incurred that would have been incurred regardless of whether the contract was won are expensed, unless those costs are explicitly chargeable to the customer in any case

(whether or not the contract is won).

The capitalised costs are amortised on a straight line basis over the expected life of the contract.

Set-up / mobilisation costs

Costs required to set up the contract, including mobilisation costs, are capitalised provided that it is probable that they will be recovered in the future and that they do not include expenses that would normally have been incurred by the Company if the contract had not been obtained. They are recognised as an expense on the basis of the proportion of actual output to estimated output under each contract. If the above conditions are not met, these costs are taken directly to profit or loss as incurred.

Costs to fulfil a contract

Where costs are incurred to fulfil a contract, they are accounted for under the relevant accounting standard (if appropriate), otherwise if the costs relate directly to a contract, the costs generate or enhance resources of the Company that will be used to satisfy performance obligations in the future and the costs are expected to be recovered then they are capitalised as contract costs assets and released to the profit or loss on an systematic basis consistent with the transfer to the customer of the goods or services to which the asset relates.

B) INCOME TAX

Rowing Australia Limited is a registered not-for-profit sporting organisation and is exempt under the provisions of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997 (as amended). Accordingly, no income tax has been provided for in these financial statements.

(C) GOODS AND SERVICES TAX (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payable are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

(D) INVENTORIES

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory is determined using the first-in-first-out basis and is net of any rebates and discounts received. Net realisable value is estimated using the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date and inventory is written down through an obsolescence provision if necessary.

(E) PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured using the cost model.

Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment, excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life to the Company, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

Leased assets and leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or their estimated useful life.

i) Depreciation Rates

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are shown below:

(F) FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Financial instruments are recognised initially on the date that the Company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value adjusted by transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Financial assets

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

Classification

On initial recognition, the Company classifies its financial assets into the following categories, those measured at fair value through profit or loss - FVTPL.

Financial assets are measured at amortised cost if the assets meet the following conditions (and are not designated as FVPL):

- they are held within a business model whose objective is to hold the financial assets and collect its contractual cash flows
- the contractual terms of the financial assets give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Discounting is omitted where the effect of discounting is immaterial. The Company's cash and cash equivalents, trade and most other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments. Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition unless the Company changes its business model for managing financial assets.

Financial assets through profit or loss

All financial assets not classified as measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income as described above are measured at EVTPL.

Net gains or losses, including any interest or dividend income are recognised in profit or loss (refer to hedging accounting policy for derivatives designated as hedging instruments.)

The Company holds derivative financial instruments to hedge its foreign currency and interest rate risk exposures. Embedded derivatives are separated from the host contract and accounted for separately if the host contract is not a financial asset and certain criteria are met.

The Company's financial assets measured at FVTPL comprise derivatives in the statement of financial position. Impairment of financial assets

Impairment of financial assets is recognised on an expected credit loss (ECL) basis for the following assets:

- financial assets measured at amortised cost
- debt investments measured at FVOCI

When determining whether the credit risk of a financial assets has increased significant since initial recognition and when estimating ECL, the Company considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort. This includes both quantitative and qualitative information and analysis based on the Company's historical experience and informed credit assessment and including forward looking information.

The Company uses the presumption that an asset which is more than 30 days past due has seen a significant increase in credit risk.

The Company uses the presumption that a financial asset is in default when:

- the other party is unlikely to pay its credit obligations to the Company in full, without recourse to the Company to actions such as realising security (if any is held); or
- the financial assets is more than 90 days past due.

Credit losses are measured as the present value of the difference between the cash flows due to the Company in accordance with the contract and the cash flows expected to be received. This is applied using a probability weighted approach.

Financial liabilities

The Company measures all financial liabilities initially at fair value less transaction costs, subsequently financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

The financial liabilities of the Company comprise trade payables, bank and other loans and lease liabilities.

(G) IMPAIRMENT OF NON-FINANCIAL ASSETS

At the end of each reporting period the Company determines whether there is evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where an indicator exists and regardless for indefinite life intangible assets and intangible assets not yet available for use, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated.

Where assets do not operate independently of other assets, the recoverable amount of the relevant cash-generating unit (CGU) is estimated.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. Value in use is the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from an asset or cash-generating unit.

Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

Reversal indicators are considered in subsequent periods for all assets which have suffered an impairment loss.

(H) CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

(I) LEASES

A contract is considered to contain a lease if it allows the Company the right to control the use of an identified asset over a period of time in return for consideration.

At inception of a contract, the Company assesses whether a lease exists.

Lessee accounting

The non-lease components included in the lease agreement have been separated and are recognised as an expense as incurred.

(i) Right-of-use asset

At the lease commencement, the Company recognises a right-of-use asset and associated lease liability for the lease term. The lease term includes extension periods where the Company believes it is reasonably certain that the option will be exercised.

The right-of-use asset is measured using the cost model where cost on initial recognition comprises of the lease liability, initial direct costs, prepaid lease payments, estimated cost of removal and restoration less any lease incentives received.

The right-of-use asset is depreciated over the lease term on a straight line basis and assessed for impairment in accordance with the impairment of assets accounting policy.

(ii) Lease liability

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the remaining lease payments at the commencement of the lease. The discount rate is the rate implicit in the lease, however where this cannot be readily determined then the Company's incremental borrowing rate is used.

Subsequent to initial recognition, the lease liability is measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method. The lease liability is remeasured whether there is a lease modification, change in estimate of the lease term or index upon which the lease payments are based (e.g. CPI) or a change in the Company's assessment of lease term.

Where the lease liability is remeasured, the right-of-use asset is adjusted to reflect the remeasurement or is recorded in profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset has been reduced to zero.

(iii) Adoption of short term leases or low value asset exception

Exceptions to lease accounting

The Company has elected to apply the exceptions to lease accounting for both short-term leases (i.e. leases with a term of less than or equal to 12 months) and leases of low-value assets (less than

\$10,000). The Company recognises the payments associated with these leases as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

(J) EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

Provision is made for the Company's liability for employee benefits, those benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled, plus related on-costs.

Employee benefits expected to be settled more than one year after the end of the reporting period have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may satisfy vesting requirements. Cashflows are discounted using market yields on high quality corporate bond rates incorporating bonds rated AAA or AA by credit agencies, with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cashflows. Changes in the measurement of the liability are recognised in profit or loss.

(K) ECONOMIC DEPENDENCE

Rowing Australia Limited is dependent on the Australian Sports Commission - Sport Australia for the majority of its revenue used to operate the business, being annual basline of \$11m for the year ended 31 December 2024. At the date of this report the directors have no reason to believe the Australian Sports Commission - Sport Australia will not continue to support Rowing Australia Limited.

(L) ADOPTION OF NEW AND REVISED ACCOUNTING STANDARDS

The Company has adopted all standards which became effective for the first time at 31 December 2023, the adoption of these standards has not caused any material adjustments to the reported financial position, performance or cash flow of the Company.

(M) NEW ACCOUNTING STANDARDS AND INTERPRETATIONS ISSUED BUT NOT YET EFFECTIVE

The AASB has issued new and amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have mandatory application dates for future reporting periods. The Company has decided not to early adopt these Standards. The adoption of these standards is not expected to cause any material adjustment to the reported financial position, performance or cash flow of the Company.

(N) COMPARATIVE FIGURES

Where required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year. There has been no impact on net assets or the Statement of Profit or Loss.

NOTE 3. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGMENTS

The directors make estimates and judgements during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

The significant estimates and judgements made have been described below.:

Key estimates - fair value of financial instruments

The Company has certain financial assets and liabilities which are measured at fair value. Where fair value has not able to be determined based on quoted price, a valuation model has been used. The inputs to these models are observable, where possible, however these techniques involve significant estimates and therefore fair value of the instruments could be affected by changes in these assumptions and inputs.

Key estimates - revenue recognition

In determining the accounting treatment for revenue recognition the Company determines if its funding arrangements should be accounted for under AASB 1058 or AASB 15. As part of this assessment, the Company has to determine if the contract is enforceable and contains sufficiently specific performance obligations.

The enforceability of an arrangement affects whether the arrangement is accounted for under AASB 15 or AASB 1058, with enforceable contracts falling within the scope of AASB 15. This in turn results in either immediate income recognition under AASB 1058 or potential income deferral under AASB 15. This assessment requires the application of judgement.

Consistent with the revenue accounting policies outlined in Note 2, under AASB 15, revenue is recognised when the performance obligation is satisfied either overtime or at a point in time. In applying these judgements, the Company recognises funding received from the Australian Sports Commission overtime as the costs associated with the delivery of the agreed performance obligations are incurred.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The Company determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives.
